



Cordova Baptist Church, Cordova, AK

The mission of the Cordova Community Christian Center is to enable Cordovans to increase in "wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man." We do this through a variety of programs and outreach activities which includes our preschool, after school kids groups, holiday activities as well as partnership with the Cordova Community Baptist Church in Vacation Bible School and other outreach activities. We have our annual Bazaar which invites the community into the Center and gives us ample opportunities to witness to them through the many gifts we receive which are for sale. We also have a variety of summer activities which brings the community into the Center and gives them times of interaction with the leaders. We are supported by not only the church but by American Baptists across the Lower 48 which is an ongoing mission experience we share with them.

The Cordova Community Christian Center was first begun in 1955 when the need for the ministry became apparent. Utilizing primarily the lower part of the church, which has several classrooms, a kitchen, and a large gymnasium-size room, the CCCC has operated a Christian pre-school, hosted numerous community programs (including Girls and Boy Scout meetings.) and offered programing for all ages. Over the years, the CCCC has been the site of many outreaches, including Home Port (currently a Saturday night coffee house). National Ministries partners with the Center through White Cross to continue to provide for supply needs and often sends volunteers to help with ministry needs.

Of the \$30,000 raised, \$15,000 will be given to the Cordova Community Christian Center in Alaska. Please consider giving to the ABWMCR 2023–24 Project!



The Book of the Month

The Bible Book of the Month of December is Isaiah

The Book of Isaiah is one of the major prophetic books in the Old Testament of the Bible. Different sections of the book may have different emphases, but the following is an attempt to provide a foundation for understanding its message.

<u>Prophecy of the Messiah</u>: Isaiah contains several significant prophecies about the coming Messiah. One of the most well-known is in Isaiah 7:14, where a virgin is foretold to conceive and bear a son, and he will be called Immanuel.

<u>Call to Repentance</u>: Isaiah emphasizes the importance of repentance and turning back to God. The people are warned about the consequences of their disobedience but are also given hope if they turn back to God.

<u>God's Sovereignty</u>: The book underscores the sovereignty of God over all nations and events. God is portrayed as the ultimate authority and ruler, controlling the course of history.

<u>Social Justice and Righteousness</u>: Isaiah condemns the mistreatment of the poor and oppressed and calls for a society based on justice and fairness.

<u>Suffering Servant</u>: Isaiah introduces the "Suffering Servant" in chapters 52 and 53. This Servant is seen as one who will bear the sins of the people and bring about redemption through his suffering.

<u>Promises of Restoration</u>: With the warnings of judgment, Isaiah also contains promises of restoration and renewal. God assures the people that, despite their current difficulties, there is hope for a future restoration.

<u>Covenant Relationship</u>: Isaiah emphasizes the covenant relationship between God and His people. Despite their unfaithfulness, God remains faithful to His covenant promises, and there is always the possibility of restoration through repentance.

<u>Holiness of God</u>: The prophet Isaiah has a profound vision of God's holiness. In Isaiah 6, he has a vision of God's glory in the temple.

The New heaven and the New Earth: Isaiah 40–66 looks forward to a new heaven and a new earth, where God's righteousness will dwell, and there will be everlasting peace.

The Book of the Month

The Bible Book of the Month of January is Romans The Book of Romans, written by the Apostle Paul, provides insights into Christian doctrine.

<u>Justification by Faith</u>: One of the central themes of Romans is the concept of justification by faith. Paul emphasizes that people are justified not by their works or adherence to the law but by faith in Jesus Christ.

<u>Sin and Redemption</u>: Romans highlights the universal problem with sin and the need for redemption. It underscores the idea that all people, both Jews and Gentiles, fall short of God's standard, and salvation is made possible through the atoning sacrifice of Jesus.

<u>Righteousness through Faith</u>: Paul emphasizes that righteousness is not earned but is a gift of God through faith, and it comes through believing in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

<u>Law and Grace</u>: The relationship between law and grace is explored in Romans. While the law reveals sin and sets a standard, it cannot justify or save. Salvation comes through God's grace and is received by faith.

<u>Universal Need for Salvation</u>: Romans makes it clear that both Jews and Gentiles are in need of salvation. It breaks down the barriers between these groups and stresses that God's offer of salvation is available for all who believe.

<u>Freedom of Sin:</u> Romans teaches that through faith in Christ, believers are freed from the power of sin. This freedom allows them to live righteous and transformed lives through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. <u>Suffering and Glory:</u> Paul discusses the relationship between suffering and glory, emphasizing that present sufferings are not comparable to the future glory that will be revealed. This encourages believers to endure trials with hope.

<u>Ethical and Moral exhortations</u>: Romans contains practical exhortations for Christian living. It addresses issues such as love, humility, obedience to authority, and the importance of unity within the Christian community.

<u>Missionary Zeal</u>: Toward the end of Romans, Paul expresses his desire to spread the gospel to new regions and encourages believers to actively participate in the mission of sharing the good news.
